St Peter to Rot, Martyr of PNG and Oceania (Part two)

In 1942 the Japanese invaded Rabaul and the Island of New Britain, Papua New Guinea, fell. Foreign missionaries were arrested, and religious activities began to be monitored. Fr. Karl Laufer MSC, the parish priest of Rakunai, Peter To Rot's village, was taken to the prison camp in Vunapope near Rabaul. There, in the very large and well-equipped Mission HQ of the MSC he was interned along with over 300 mainly MSC and OLSH religious. Before leaving, he entrusted Peter with the spiritual responsibility of the Rakunai community.

From then on, Peter officially became responsible for the faith life of the people. He visited homes, organized Sunday prayers, catechized adults and children, prepared weddings, and accompanied the sick. He recorded everything in the parish registers. He acted with such zeal and prudence that, even under military occupation, the faith remained alive and strong in the village.

During the first months of the Japanese occupation, there was still some tolerance for religious practice. But as the war progressed and fears of defeat grew, Japanese officials began to ban public prayers, disperse groups of worshippers, and monitor Christian leaders. Faith came to be seen as resistance. In Rakunai, Peter To Rot was at the centre of this tension.

In 1944, the Japanese held a meeting with tribal chiefs from the region. They wanted to ensure political loyalty by offering cultural benefits. One of the favours granted was the legalization of traditional polygamy, which had been forbidden for those wishing to become Catholics. Also, previous governments had banned the practise. It was a calculated move: they hoped it would neutralize the influence of Christian catechists. Peter was one of the first to openly oppose it. As the spiritual leader of the community, he refused to bless polygamous unions. He continued to teach catechism, promote Christian marriages, organize prayers and often acted in secret. To protect the parishioners and avoid direct confrontation, he began to hold nightly meetings in caves hidden in the forests. There, by the light of oil lamps, he read the Bible, explained the sacraments and celebrated the faith. He would walk up to 25 kilometres to collect consecrated hosts smuggled out of the internment camp in Vunapope. "God's work is everything," he said. His wife, Paula, worried, tried to convince him to stop. He replied: "It is my duty to die for God the Father, Son, Holy Spirit — and for my people."

The Japanese army began to call all catechists to the police station, questioning them about their activities and warning them that the ban on any Christian religious practice was now total. Peter was summoned several times by the Japanese military police. Interrogated and threatened, he responded calmly to the parishioners: "They want to take away our prayers. But I am your catechist. I will do my duty, even if it costs me my life." He courageously defended the sanctity of marriage. He told couples: "Fidelity is a gift from God. Our people have the right to receive the whole Gospel, undiluted." The community supported him, but everyone knew that the risk was increasing. The guards raided his home, confiscated his books, searched the meeting places, and watched his every move. Even so, he continued. Peter confirmed that he was still doing what he was supposed to do as a catechist. He explained to them that what he and the catechists were doing had nothing to do with the war.

Peter's open crusade against polygamy led him to confront certain powerful local people, policemen, judges, etc., who wanted to have already married women as wives. A policeman, already married, had kidnapped a married woman and assaulted her husband. To Rot and the father of the woman found her and returned her to her husband. Infuriated, the policeman and others reported Peter to the Japanese authorities.

In January 1945, soldiers came to take him away. His cell was small, stuffy, and windowless. The soldiers only took him out of there from time to time to tend to the pigs. He prayed constantly and showed no fear. He was grateful for the food brought by his mother and Paula, his wife. When the people visited him, he would simply say: "Pray. Our faith cannot be bought. I am in prison for those who break their marriage vows and for those who do not want to see God's work go forward. That is all. I must die. I have already been condemned to death."

One day, Paula, his wife, went to visit him accompanied by their two young children. Pregnant with their third child, she asked Peter to accept the Japanese request, to say that he would stop being a catechist, just to be released. Peter made the sign of the cross and replied: "I must glorify the Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit and thus help my people." He asked her to bring him his catechist's cross. On the day which turned out to be the day of his martyrdom, he asked his mother to bring him his catechist's clothes. He told his mother that he had been informed that a Japanese doctor would visit him later. He said he was not sick, and that he knew what would happen to him.

At dusk, Peter washed, shaved, and put on clean clothes. He sat in front of the cell entrance and prayed. He had come down with a cold. A formal trial was not held. Instead, taking advantage of his cold, the Japanese doctor gave him an injection and made him take a so-called medicine. He stuffed Peter's ears and nose with cotton wool. As the poison took too long to activate the doctor held his mouth closed, while a soldier struck him on the neck with a wooden beam. He died of a combination of poisoning and asphyxiation. Despite efforts to hide everything, a prisoner witnessed the injection being administered. What followed was a long and painful agony.

The policeman, To Metapa, who was responsible for his arrest, came from the scene and said: **'He, the "mission boy", was very sick and has died'.** This occurred a mere six weeks before the end of the war in the Pacific which ended on August 15th, 1945.

His funeral, well attended, was held in silence out of fear of the soldiers. The people already venerated him as a martyr. The news of his death spread. His fidelity spoke louder than any decree and bore fruit. In his village in the following years vocations arose — all formed in the witness of the catechist who preferred to die rather than deny his faith and the integrity and holiness of the Sacrament of Marriage which he courageously affirmed.

Pope Leo XIV will proclaim Peter To Rot a Saint in St Peter's, Rome, this Sunday, 19th October 2025. "St Peter To Rot, pray that we will have the clear-sighted faith and courage to proclaim the truth, beauty and love of Christ Jesus in our daily lives and to serve others as your servant Peter To Rot did so consistently."


MESSAGE FROM THE ARCHDIOCESE OF SYDNEY
